OPOSSUMS

Common Name: opossum

Other Names: big rat, citrus rat, possum

Scientific Name: Didelphis virginiana

Appearance: size - head and body 15-20 inches long; tail 9-20 inches long

weight

- adults weigh 9-13 pounds

color

- gray

distinguishing features - marsupial pouch, inside toe on hind foot faces

in opposite direction of other toes, pointed

nose, and rat-like tail

Range:

- statewide

Habitat:

- wooded or open areas near streams and swamps

Diet:

- amphibians, reptiles, small mammals, birds, eggs, insects, fruits, and

grains

production: - 1-3 litters per year from January to July

- an average of 7 young are born undeveloped and attach to one of

13 teats in pouch for 2 months

Behavior:

- mostly noctumal and solitary; climbs trees

- play "opossum" dead as a last resort to avoid danger

Problems:

- get into garbage cans

- eat pet food

- eat cultivated fruits and vegetables - may prey on poultry and their eggs

- enters homes through holes, ripped screens, and vent and duct

systems

Solutions:

- fasten garbage can lids with a rubber strap

- do not leave pet food outside at night - surround garden with electric fencing

- live-trap with cage trap

- if hesitant about handling, contact a local nuisance trapper

- Legal Aspects: the use of leghold and quick kill (conibear) traps is illegal
 - in non-urban areas opossum can be shot at night throughout the year with the use of a dog and light, and a .22 caliber firearm (check local ordinances)
 - may be removed only by a permitted nuisance wildlife trapper
