FLYING SQUIRRELS

Common Name: flying squirrel

Other Names: southern flying squirrel

Scientific Name: Glaucomys volans

Appearance: length - about 9 inches, including 3 to 4 inch tail

weight

- about 3 ounces, adult

color

- sandy brown with white belly; dense soft fur

other

- noticeable fold of skin running between fore- and hind-limbs

Range:

- statewide

Habitat:

hardwood forests

- tree squirrel, rarely active on ground

- normally den in tree cavities

Diet:

- seeds, fruits and nuts

- insects, bird eggs and nestling birds commonly taken

- some vegetation

Reproduction: - 2 to 4 young per litter

- 2 litters per year common

Behavior:

- active after dark

- glide from tree to tree in search of food .

- may be heard landing on roof or side of homes following a glide

- makes a high-pitched squeak

Problems:

- roosting in attics, crawl spaces, etc., in homes

- chewing on ornamental and potted plants

- damaging screens

Solutions:

- capture and removal using live traps baited with peanuts, pecans or

sunflower seed is recommended in solving problems with individual

animals

- repellents, scare devices and ultrasonics are not effective, although taste

repellents may solve short-term chewing problems to non-edible objects

- lethal control, where legal

Legal Aspects:

- may be destroyed when damaging property
