PIGEONS

Common Name: pigeon

Other Names: rock dove, dove

Scientific Name: Columba livia

Appearance:

size

- typically about 11 inches in length

- about 13 ounces in weight

color

- usually gray with whitish rump

- black bars on upper wings and across tail - other colors include white, tan and black

Range:

- abundant throughout Florida

Habitat:

- prefers human-altered landscapes (esp. farms, urban areas, parks)

Diet:

- primarily eats grain, weed and other seeds

- will eat a variety of cereal or grain-based human foods

broduction: - lays 1-2 eggs per clutch about every 5 weeks nearly year-round

- crude nest usually constructed on flat platforms and ledges

Behavior:

- much of day spent roosting on open ledges near food source

- prefer to roost in loosely organized groups or flocks

Problems:

- droppings from nesting and roosting birds damage and deface buildings, landscaping and other property

- droppings may carry and spread disease to humans, livestock and pets

- may transmit bird mites and other biting parasites to homes and

- nesting birds may foul and damage air conditioning units and other mechanical devices

- noise from roosting birds may be disturbing

Solutions:

- preventing access to roosting and nesting sites with screen or netting
- making roosting ledges uncomfortable by using porcupine wires or sticky repellents
- making roosting areas unattractive by visual repellents such as mylar or rubber balloons secured above the roost
- lethal methods in areas where they are legal

Legal Aspects:

- no state or federal laws regulating harvest or otherwise protecting this species
- use of poisons requires a permit from the Florida Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission
- check local ordinances before lethal methods are employed
