FOX SQUIRRELS

Common Name: fox squirrel

Other Names: Sherman's fox squirrel, mangrove fox squirrel

Scientific Name: Sciurus niger

Appearance: length - about 24 inches, including 12 inch tail

weight

- between 2 and 2 1/2 pounds

color

- rusty tan body and tail; dark head and white on nose and ears; dark forms occur, but white on nose and ears is still

evident .

Range:

- dry sandy pinelands statewide; endangered south of Lake Okeechobee

Habitat:

- upland pine forests, usually dominated by longleaf or south Florida

slash pine

- rarely found in urbanized area

Diet:

- mostly pine seeds in summer, acorns at other times

- rarely vegetation, bird eggs, nestling birds and insects

Reproduction: - 2 to 4 young per litter; up to 2 litters per year

Behavior:

- active during day, sometimes foraging on ground

- natural shyness can disappear when fed

- distinctive loping gait when active on ground

Problems:

- roosting in attics, crawl spaces, etc. in homes

- chewing on ornamental and potted plants

- eating fruit, nut and vegetable crops; digging in yard

- raiding bird feeders and other pet food

- damaging screens

Solutions:

- removing attractant (e.g., bird food) is effective when feasible

- repellents, scare devices and ultrasonics are not effective, although taste repellents may solve short-term chewing problems to non-

edible objects

Legal Aspects:

- Fox squirrels are protected in Florida and may not be trapped or killed unless permitted by the commission or during legal hunting seasons.
